Blessed are the Peacemakers for they shall be called the Children of God. Mark 5:9

My dear sisters of the USFW, this verse is your PLAN and your PROMISE.

Our USFW uses two tools to get their mission out to all women. One is The Advocate and the other is Carolina Woman. Our USFW president, Janet Robbins, wrote in Carolina Woman (March-May 2022) issue. Janet said, "The January February issue of The Advocate inspired me to keep praying and to help promote our giving to our *GREENSHEET PROJECTS*. Our total goal for 2022 was under budgeted by \$10,000. This is mainly the result of smaller USFW groups and less support" (due to the disruption caused by Covid).

Our President called our attention to another article in The Advocate, (Jan/Feb issue) written by Rita Mintmier. It encouraged us to develop ways to involve children in missions. For instance, count the number of water faucets in your home and put a penny in a jar for each one. Or count the number of electrical outlets in your home, put a penny in a jar for each one, and so on. After finishing the project put the money into the missions program for people who have no running water or no electricity.

Previously, I have called your attention to The Advocate and Carolina Woman which we use to communicate information to each other. Now, I want to call your attention to an ongoing project which raises funds for Right Sharing of World Resources (RSWR). It is our Used Stamps Project. How it works: each member saves their used stamps, who give them in to their USFW president who takes, or sends these collected stamps to Friends Emergency Material Assistance Program (FEMAP). FEMAP sends them to RSWR in Richmond, Indiana where some lovely people organize and sell them to stamp collectors. Over the last few years, thousands of dollars have been raised for RSWR from selling used stamps collected by USFW.

Notice this excerpt from Geraldine Brannon's email: "Hi Linda, Thank you for your report in Carolina Woman. I have some questions on used stamps. Am I correct, that you do not want Forever stamps and any stamps that have the USA flag or anything that pertains to USA?"

My answer: "Any stamps are good. However, the flag stamps are so plentiful that they don't sell. Any forever stamps are needed. Also, anything with USA on it is good. Foreign stamps are good. The address to send them to is FEMAP, 606 E Springfield Rd., High Point, N.C. 27263".

Finding Hope in Today's World

Do you wonder about the value of TRUTH in our world today? Do you miss the security of TRUST in our governing bodies, both local and national? Do you feel overwhelmed with news of rising temperatures, hunger/famine in the world, wildfires, diseases, gun violence and tyrants that are provoking wars?

The following devotional thoughts from Fruit of the Vine (6/28/2022) by Micah Bales gives us reason for HOPE.

Philippians4:4-7 Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Rejoice, Paul tells us. And be gentle, be thankful. Don't worry. And the key phrase in this passage: THE LORD IS NEAR.

Rejoice. It is the nearness of God's living presence within us, the victory of God in Jesus that makes rejoicing not only possible but unavoidable.

Be Gentle. We can be gentle because the Lord is near, because we don't have to make everything turn out right. We don't have to force it. We don't have to be in control. Our job is to love, to speak the truth, to act as the Spirit guides us and as Jesus teaches us.

Be thankful. The nearness of God makes thanksgiving possible—God's creative generosity, renewing and sustaining us each day, inspires our thankfulness in every moment.

Do not worry. We are commanded to give up worry because God is sovereign. God is near, powerful, and loving. God controls our destiny.

Do not worry, not because there is nothing to worry about, but because—in the words of George Fox: "The power of the Lord is over all." There is an ocean of light and love that flows over the ocean of darkness.

Do not worry, because the troubles we now face are transient, mortal, temporary—but God's promises are unlimited and unconditional. God does not fail, and God will not abandon us.

Rejoice always. Be thankful. Do not worry. Be gentle. The Lord is near-bringing peace.

A Lighthouse

The first known lighthouse was the "Pharos of Alexandria" in Egypt. It was built between 300 and 280 BC. It was about 450 feet tall. This lighthouse was one of the Ancient Wonders of the World. Sadly, it succumbed to earthquakes in the 1300s. There are still many functioning lighthouses in the world that followed the lead of The Pharos of Alexandria.

This summer our family made our annual trip to the beach. During our stay, we went by boat to Southport for lunch. As we arrived, there in front of us was Old Baldy. It is the oldest standing lighthouse in North Carolina. It has been towering over Bald Head Island for over 200 years. Before this lighthouse was built, mariners looked for the "bald head" dunes to help them navigate their way into the Cape Fear River from the Atlantic Ocean. Many ships were wrecked because they failed to find the channel without a light to guide them.



Today, North Carolina has seven standing lighthouses. All of them except Bald Head, which is privately owned, are electronically operated by the US Coast Guard. Think of how many lives have been saved by these seven lighthouses, as well as, all of the other lighthouses all over the world! Their guiding lights have led many a traveler safely home.

One of our books on the 2022-2023 Reading List is <u>Led by the Light</u> by Mary Glenn Hadley. That title reflects how a lighthouse became a symbol of both her dedication to following Jesus in her own life and her commitment to be a light to others. For 20 years, Mary Glenn Hadley served in a Friends mission hospital in Kenya. Her book tells of her struggles and successes in sharing the Light of Christ.

This is only one of the many wonderful books on our Reading List. Please check out our new books and let me know if I can help you in purchasing some of them. There will be a book display at our fall conference on September 17 at Centre Friends or let me know if I can put some books in the mail for you.
